#### A Plan Based on Love


"Love your enemies! Do well to them...You must be compassionate, just as your Father is compassionate."

Luke 6:35a, 36 (NLT)

This Sundays title for worship is õLoveö and our scripture is one of the most difficult ideas that Jesus left for us to do if we are to be His followers. In this part of Lukes Gospel Jesus acknowledges that this is not easy to do. But Jesus also points out that while we prefer to hold in contempt those persons whom we view as a threat, or disgust us. or those we feel have done harm to us, God has not done the same and so neither should we.

Such love is at the heart of our vision statement for Asbury that we adopted in 2010: We envision a community in love with God, one another, and our neighbors, evidenced through the transformation of ourselves and our neighborhood. Love of God, each other and our neighbor is a not easy. This statement moves from the easier to the most difficult in its demand on our tolerance and on our heart. We may think that we can love God but this is about as far as we can go. But we are not given this option according to Jesus. In chapter 14 of John, Jesus says that other who accept my commandments and obey them are the ones who love me.ö In other words, loving each other and

even our neighbors is not an option for those who claim to love God. This statement of vision is incomplete unless we include everyone in our community.

Love is at the heart of our core values or at least love is at the heart of those values that we claim to hold to as the rock of our salvation. This claim is then at the heart of how we know that we are obedient to Jesus. The proof of our love is visible in the change that takes place in us and around us. But it is not just a little change that we are after. We anticipate radical, transforming change. We actually believe, or say that we believe when we say we are Christ followers, that each of us are being made new. We are an unfinished masterpiece and God is the artist. Our community is that part of Godøs canvas where we are being shaped and shaded. We are not reproduced from molds on an assembly line. We are each handcrafted to be a unique creation yet we each carry the image of God in our person. This is also true of each and every neighbor.

Transforming love can be seen. It can be felt. Such love has a spirit about it that is so pervasive that visitors can sense such love in the air they breathe when they encounter Asbury for the first time. This is the sort of love that is so powerful that persons are drawn to it like metal to a magnet. It is a contagious love and so each person infected with its power in turn is able to love others and this is the power that transforms overgrown vegetation on abandoned plots of land into beautiful gardens that feed our bodies and our souls. This manifestation of love is seen and felt by persons unfamiliar with the transforming love of Christ and their hearts are stirred as the Holy Spirit beacons them to see the power of God at work in their midst.

This is the plan that God has in mind for Asbury. God speaks to us through the prophet Jeremiah õFor I know the plans I have for youí They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hopeö (Jeremiah 29:11 NLT). Our discernment of Godøs strategic plan for us is nothing more and nothing less than a statement of faith in a God who both asks more of us than we can possibly do and gives us all that we need to do it. After Jesus told His followers in John 14 that He would soon be leaving them His final words at that time was õCome, letøs be going.ö A call to action towards a different future. The lives of Jesusø followers had changed dramatically since meeting Jesus and their lives would continue to change in ways that they could never have imagined. But they followed in faith just as we are asked to follow in faith.

May you seize this very moment to stop and take in the blessing that is life itself and may you experience the joy of gratitude. May God bless you, may Jesus Christ walk with you and may the Holy Spirit fill you with good things. May your heart be filled with love for God and your neighbors.

#### **Methodism Core Values**

What good is it...if you say you have faith but don't show it by your actions? Can that kind of faith save anyone? Suppose you see a brother or sister who has no food or clothing, and you say, "Good-bye and have a good day; stay warm and eat well"—but then you don't give that person any food or clothing. What good does that do? So you see, faith by itself isn't enough. Unless it produces good deeds, it is dead and useless.

James 2:14-17 (NLT)

Last weeks Circuit Rider began a discussion of our core values as a congregation of the United Methodist Church. What are those core beliefs and ideas that we value above all else and that should drive our decisions? The Social Principles that are found in both our *Book of Discipline* and our *Book of Resolutions* is good place to begin. As we are able to articulate our core values we are in a better place for conversations about our future. Our core values help us to make a better decision in the midst of the daily noise of persons trying to convince us to agree with their choices. As Christians we face such decisions in the midst of a world shouting for us to make different choices. If we can stay in touch with our core values we can make hard decisions with confidence.

Our Social Principles are organized into sections beginning with *The Natural World* and continuing through the various ways that we are affected by our global and local community. These communities include nurturing, social, economic, political and the world. In our section on the *Economic Community* we read the following:

Because we recognize that the long-term reduction of poverty must move beyond services to and employment for the poor, which can be taken away, we emphasize measures that build and maintain the wealth of poor people, including asset-building strategies such as individual development savings accounts, micro-enterprise development programs, programs enabling home ownership, and financial management training and counseling. We call upon churches to develop these and other ministries that promote asset-building among the poor...Poverty most often has systemic causes, and therefore we do not hold poor people morally responsible for their economic state. \*

Too often our churches lose their way and our core values are replaced by the worlds values without our conscious recognition. One of the key responsibilities of a pastor is to bring this recognition into consciousness. This is not easy. No one likes to be reminded that they need to take corrective action. Nevertheless, we cannot say that love is a foundation for our lives if we are unwilling to hold each other accountable for how our statements of faith are lived out. How often have you heard such statements as: õWhy is that our responsibility?ö õWe tried that before and it didnst work.ö õWe canst afford to do that.ö õWe already have our hands full.ö õIts not our fault the neighborhood changed.ö The list of statements that stand in contrast to Gods promise of abundance are the sound of empty excuses for our lack of faith.

#### A Center for Health & Wellness

Stretch out your hand with healing power; may miraculous signs and wonders be done through the name of your holy servant Jesus."

Acts 4:30 (NLT)

One of our key strategic goals stated in our discernment of Godøs strategic plan for Asbury is for us to become a center for health and wellness solutions for our community. What might this look like? Does this mean that we are opening a clinic? The answer is yes in the spiritual sense. Of course, God may surprise us.

During June we provided space for two physicians to see patients. Dr Molly McMullin-Laird and her husband Dr Quentin McMullin are both licensed physicians who practice both traditional medicine along with anthroposophical medicine. Their clinic in Ann Arbor includes a large, organic farm that provides fresh produce and ingredients for their practice. This team of physicians along with six interns saw patients, offered treatment and information on healthier lifestyles. This is one example of how Asbury is already living into this strategic goal.



The Asbury Community Help Center is open Monday through Thursday each week. This center is operated by the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan and provides bottled water and food for anyone who is in need. Hundreds of families visit Asbury each day. They are greeted on certain days by representatives from Genesee Health Systems as they drive by the mobile health unit that houses two

clinical offices along with one or more healthcare professionals. Their focus is mental health but they often refer persons to other healthcare services. The Flint CORE team is also on hand to make sure that each household has the capability of filtered water in their homes, they provide water filters, filter cartridge replacements, information and can arrange to have an installation

team go into a home to do necessary repairs and replacements to ensure that their water filter is working effectively. These are all examples of health and wellness solutions.

In another partnership with the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan Asbury is providing breakfast and lunch for children and their families Monday through Friday. This service is lieu of the free meal programs offered when schools are in session. Chef Kevin Croom supervises this program. Kevin has a degree is nutrition and is a professional chef with a passion for preparing food that is both good for you and a joy to eat. He also has a passion for sharing his knowledge and skills so that others can do the same for themselves. Kevin

utilizes fresh produce and herbs grown on the Asbury farm. He knows what he can expect to receive from our farmers because he worked with them on the list of crops based on his goal of good, nutritious food for our residents. Doesnot this sound like a center for health and wellness solutions?



We began implementing the plan that God has in mind for Asbury several years ago. There have been missteps and mishaps along the way but there has also been great joy and many testimonies from our community. We are just getting started. God has so much more in store for us. Volunteer some time to help out on the Asbury farm or with Kevin in the kitchen or serving meals. Say thank you to Ron who drives our bus each day to pick up families without transportation where the distance is impractical. Meanwhile, the Neighborhood Connection team will be out in the neighborhood going to the homes where our neighbors cannot come to us. But this is a topic for another article.
