Hope is a Verb

Our next series for this Fall is titled Hope is a Verb. Hopelessness is a common ailment in our community. Worries over making ends meet, schools, health concerns, violence, blight, high utility bills and more, take their toll on our attitude towards most everything. We hope that we will be saved from all of our worries.

But what does it mean to be saved? To experience salvation? Salvation is a word from our faith that takes on a multitude of meanings depending upon what we were taught, which church we attend and most importantly, our lived experience. Our friends might ask us "Are you saved?" and our answer may be different from what we believe inside. We might not be comfortable asking "What do you mean by saved?" But this is the real question isn't it? We hope that we are saved - that we have or will experience salvation

without really knowing what this should mean. Is it all about after we die? What about now?

In scripture we find a wide range of illustrations but a lot of our focus as Christians is on the story of Nicodemus who Jesus told about rebirth - being born again. Yet there are many stories in both the old and new testaments about salvation from health concerns, making ends meet, violence and other "what about now" challenges that face us. God gave salvation to several suffering persons through the prophet Elisha. Jesus did the same. The Gospels are rich with healing, feeding and other miracles. Hope is a verb. Hope implies actions with results. Salvation lies at the center of hope.

I have lived a blessed life. But there were times when I

There was a man named Nicodemus, a Jewish religious leader who was a Pharisee. After dark one evening, he came to speak with Jesus. "Rabbi," he said, "we all know that God has sent you to teach us. Your miraculous signs are evidence that God is with you." Jesus replied, "I tell you the truth, unless you are born again, you cannot see the Kingdom of God." "What do you mean?" exclaimed Nicodemus. "How can an old man go back into his mother's womb and be born again?"
John 3:1-4 (NLT)

didn't believe this statement to be true. While I have had my share of broken relationships, health scares, close calls and financial set backs, parts of my life are beyond what I would have expected early on. I grew up in a Christian family that made church going a priority. Even as a child I felt as though I had a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Perhaps out of these experiences I tend to be optimistic about the future. I really do see cups as more half full than half empty.

I am a Missionary

I have been called by many titles from pastor to CEO. Too often the title others choose for me is an attempt to place me in a role to make a point that they want to be true. Some clergy are chaplains, some are consolers and counselors, others are shepherds. Some may try to be several persons at the

same time. I am none of these although some of the functions I serve may have common activities.

I am a missionary. I serve the community around me bringing the love of Christ to broken lives. Therefore, my priorities come out of first seeking my

own relationship with Jesus Christ. That is, I strive to live a life in the Spirit. To be led by the Spirit of God and not by the will of men and women who might hope to control me. And God has chosen me to serve as a missionary.

Therefore, I am called to speak and do acts of hope. The Spirit helps me through the fruit that can only come from the Spirit. These fruits are listed in Galatians 5:22-23 as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. I cannot produce these fruits on my own power and when others testify against me they are really testifying against the Holy Spirit. When others claim that I fall short of their expectations they are expecting fruit from me that the Spirit has chosen not to offer me. When others claim that I am not doing what they expect me to do they are expecting someone who is not a missionary.

I am a missionary. And as a missionary I am called to bring the good news of salvation to a people who want desperately to be saved. I am not, therefore, called to minister to the already saved. Missionaries carry out the work of mission and the mission to which I am called is to be an agent of transformation that is only possible

through faith in Jesus Christ. A faith which requires obedience. A faith which requires surrender. A faith in which there is no room for our control of others. A faith that relies on the only force who can save us. The Holy Spirit of God. A faith that understands that hope is a verb and that salvation is both now and later.

Jesus stated the mission for those of us called to be missionaries in Luke 4:18-19. It was a restatement of the same mission that God spoke to missionaries through the Prophet Elijah. The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be released, that the blind will see, that the oppressed will be set free, and that the time of the Lord's favor has come. This is the mission of the missionary. This is the mission of a hope that saves.

Will you join me in this mission? Will you follow the One that I follow? Not led by me but walking with me? Will you follow in the

footsteps of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ who was, who is and who forever will be the source of life and salvation. Will you follow Him with me and bring the good news of salvation to a world desperate for hope?

I suspect that I get some of this attitude from my mother. My mom was not one to dwell on the past. She did not cry over spilled milk. She grabbed a rag or mop, cleaned it up and moved on. Some of this way of being undoubtedly comes from living out our beliefs in God's nature. The idea of forgiveness allows for starting over, second chances, new beginnings. Salvation is at its core a new beginning that is unrooted in the past. We are freshly transplanted into new soil, full of nutrients with promise of new growth and abundant fruit. Yet our roots are not yet established. We can be easily torn out and blown away by the winds of struggle and disappointment.

New beginnings are inevitable. I suspect that each day is a new beginning of some

sort. Even when our days seem quite repetitive. The parts keep coming down the assembly line and our joints ache from repetition leaving damage to nerves and muscles. It is easy to confuse our propensity to want to control every last detail in an effort to avoid the reality of failure. The world is changing even while each part looks like the last one. The parts only share common attributes and not the same molecules.

Our series will focus on the stories of the prophet Elisha found in 2 Kings 4. The miracles found in this text are incredible. Clearly, when Elisha asked the prophet Elijah for a double portion of power before Elijah was taken up to heaven, God granted Elisha his wish. The miracles we read

about are reminiscent of the miracles we find in the Gospels that were performed by Jesus. They were miracles of salvation that offered live-giving solutions for persons who seemed to run out of options and hope. Does God still work miracles today through people? To answer this question with a yes is to claim our faith in a God that is active in our world.

We finished our discussion of the book Soil and Sacrament. This book took us on a spiritual journey by sharing the spiritual journey of its author. We learned how working with the soil is both biblical and draws us closer to God.

Our next book will take us on a journey of a different nature as we focus our attention on the Holy Spirit. Our guide will be pastor, author and church planter Francis Chan, founder of Cornerstone Church in Simi Valley, California. He is also the founder of Eternity Bible College and sits on the board of Children's Hunger Fund. Recently, Francis is planting churches in the San Francisco area and recently launched a countrywide discipleship movement called Multiply with David Platt. Francis and his wife Lisa live in Northern California with their five children.

Francis writes "as Jesus ascended into heaven, He promised to send the Holy Spirit—the

Helper—so that we could be true and living witnesses for Christ. Unfortunately, today's church has admired the gift but neglected to open it." Pastor Chan contends that we've ignored the Spirit for far too long, and we are reaping the disastrous results.

help enhance our presence in the social media by posting on our Facebook and utilizing our website for blogging.


Housing - the Asbury House offers local college students a way to use their gifts and passions together with their faith in building a better neighborhood.
